

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#### What is CREation?

The CREation Community Grants Program is a multi-level funding program that supports strengths-based, community-focused and youth-led projects taking place in communities across Canada. CREation aims to empower and support Indigenous youth to take ownership over the wellness of their peers. This program helps increase available resources for both incorporated organizations and grassroots collectives that seek to create impactful community change and enhance the wellness, resiliency, and engagement of Indigenous youth. CRE provides capacity-building for youth-led organizations in the form of innovative mentorship, educational resources, and workshops.

#### CREation was designed with two purposes:

- 1.to support Indigenous and reconciliation-focused grassroots groups and organizations; and
- 2. in response to Call to Action 66, to understand how governments, corporations, and foundations can better fund programming that supports Indigenous youth.





The CREation Granting Program reaffirms CRE's commitment to grassroots and community-level responses to service gaps and barriers by empowering Indigenous youth and communities to take ownership over their own wellness. It helps CRE to achieve its purpose by providing Indigenous youth leaders with the skills, resources and opportunities to cause positive change in their community, and supports the ongoing development and formalization of Indigenous-led community groups. Through creating networks of Youth leaders and projects, CREation allows CRE to support programming in more communities than we can reach ourselves, and reaffirms our commitment to empowering distinctions-based programming across the country.

As one of only a handful of national Indigenous funders, our focus is on decreasing barriers for community programs and projects, and uplifting emerging youth leaders. Our program answers significant funding gaps around qualified donee requirements, as we are uniquely situated to fund grassroots groups and initiatives. Because our team is comprised of staff with previous program delivery experience, we also are able to provide supports that enable youth leaders to navigate barriers in program implementation and to build the skills so that they are better able to navigate funding landscapes in the future.

### 2022/2023ADVISORYCIRCLE

The CREation Granting Program is governed and led by an Advisory Circle of young Indigenous leaders. The Advisory Circle meets six times a year to provide guidance, strategic direction and priority setting for the CREation Program. Advisory Circle members also sit as a part of Review Circles, where they make funding recommendations. Advisory Circle members are from regions across the country, and have expertise in community programming, youth engagement, evaluation and community priorities. They function as a vital part of CREation, and help to make sure that funding decisions and our program model are grounded in community and by youth voices.






This year, CREation released \$2,226,000 in funding to 96 projects. We received over 160 applications, representing a funding request of \$4,522,835. While we received the steepest increase in applications from British Columbia and Alberta, we worked with the Advisory Circle to balance out funding needs across regions, and to prioritize mobilizing funding into communities we hadn't previously funded projects in.

This year, we focused heavily on doing outreach and engagement in on-reserve communities, which resulted in larger numbers of applications. Going forward, we will continue to prioritize applications from remote and on-reserve communities.

CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAMMING Throughout the year, CREation runs workshops focused on increasing the skills and resources that youth have access to around program development, delivery, evaluation and organizational leadership. This past year, we ran 46 Capacity Building and Relationship Building Sessions with over 500 youth participants.

RELATIONSHIP BUILDING PROGRAMMING Relationship Building Programming centers on providing youth opportunities to network, learn from each other and build connections. We ran Grantee Panels, where youth project leaders came together to talk about their projects and things they had learnt, as well as small workshops that focused on grantees sharing skills with each other. This past year, we ran 6 Relationship Building Sessions with over 350 youth participants.

ANNUAL GRANTEE GATHERING In October 2023, the CREation team hosted it's second online Grantee Gathering. Grantees participated virtually in workshops and programming such as: Building Connections to the Land, Running Arts-based Programming, Grantee Panels and Networking Sessions.

MULTI-YEAR IMPACT


Over \$5.2 million in funding has been mobilized to youth-led organizations and grassroots groups. CREation has given out 308 grants to 215 unique grantee groups (led by 885 youth leaders) to run community projects.

Projects have been run in all 13 Provinces/Territories and to date have **reached over 97,000 Indigenous youth and community members directly**, and over 99,000 indirect (digital engagement) youth participants.



# YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STREAM

**Impact Overview** 




- The focus of this stream is to fund new and emerging micro-projects that focus on increasing the resilience, engagement and wellness of youth.
- Across the 4 application rounds, CRE received 25 proposals from 8 Provinces and Territories representing a request for \$119,585 in funding

# The Youth Empowerment Stream provided \$96,750 in funding to 21 groups in 3 Provinces and Territories

- The majority of funded groups were in Ontario, followed by Alberta and British Columbia.
- 52% of grantees are supporting youth in urban communities, 19% in on reserve communities, 14% in remote communities and 19% in rural communities.
- The 21 funded groups will collectively reach 3,500 Indigenous youth.
- 66% of projects focused on Youth & Community Wellness, 29% on Arts & Culture and 5% on Innovation & Change.

# SMALL PROJECT STREAM

**Impact Overview** 




In November 2022, we launched the Small Project Stream to support groups who are growing and expanding their projects. Grants of \$15,000 were provided to support youth-led and youth-focused initiatives.

- CRE received 21 proposals from 6 Provinces and Territories, representing a request of \$309,700.
- 67% of applications were from unincorporated groups (including grassroots collectives, Youth Councils, small organizations, and community groups). Because these groups are not registered/incorporated, they face large barriers to access funding, particularly from mainstream funding streams.
- 67% of applicants had an annual budget of less than \$50,000, with 71% of those having a budget of less than \$15,000.

# The Small Project Funding Stream provided \$160,000 in funding to 11 groups in 4 Provinces and Territories

- Grantees predominantly served either First Nations youth specifically, or First Nations, Métis and Inuit youth.
- The majority of funded groups were in Ontario.
- 45% of funded projects were focused on Youth and Community Wellness, and 27% of funded projects focused on Intergenerational Relationship Building
- The 11 funded groups will collectively reach 5.760 youth and over 2,750 community members.

# MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING

**Impact Overview** 


The Medium Project Funding Stream provided funding of up to \$30,000 to Indigenous youth-led projects creating impactful community change and increasing the wellness, resiliency and engagement of Indigenous youth.

- CRE received 36 applications from 8 Provinces and Territories, representing a request of \$1,060,200
- 81% of applicants had an annual budget of less than \$100,000, with 69% of those having a budget of less than \$50,000.

The Medium Project Funding Stream provided \$625,000 in funding to 22 groups in 9 Provinces and Territories

- Projects funded had a wide range of focus areas, including:
  - Youth and Community Wellness (11 projects)
  - Resiliency Building (2 projects)
  - Innovation and Change (1 project)
  - Intergenerational Relationship Building (2 projects)
  - Arts and Culture (6 projects)
- 36% of grantees are supporting youth in urban centers, 32% are working on reserve, 18% are serving remote communities and 13% of grantees are supporting youth in rural locations.
- The 22 funded groups will collectively reach 1,600 youth and 1,000 community members

# LARGE PROJECT FUNDING

Impact Overview




The Large Project Funding Stream provided funding of up to \$100,000 to Indigenous youth-led projects creating impactful community change and increasing the wellness, resiliency and engagement of Indigenous youth.

- Applications were only open to incorporated non-profits and registered charities, or grassroots groups with a trustee organization
- The focus of this stream was on providing substantial funding to groups that were looking to enhance their capacity to run programs/services, adapt to emerging needs and/or to expand their work.
- CRE received 22 proposals from 9 Provinces and Territories, representing a need of over \$1,666,000 in funding.

# The Large Project Stream provided \$591,000 in funding to 8 groups in 5 Provinces and Territories

- 50% of grantees had operational budgets of less than \$250,000
- Projects were funded in British Columbia, Manitoba, the Northwest Territories, Ontario and the Yukon
- 63% of funded groups were focused on Youth and Community Wellness
- The 8 funded groups will collectively reach 544 youth and 300 community members through stable, longterm services.

# ND AND FOOD SOVEREIGNTY




The Land and Food Sovereignty Stream provided funding of up to \$25,000 to Indigenous youth-led projects that increased opportunities for youth to participate in land-based programming, learn about food and medicines and engage with knowledge keepers.

- Each year, the CREation Advisory Circle determines 2-4 Emerging Needs Streams. These streams are different from other streams in that they have a targeted focus and funding goal that is based on community needs. Land and Food Sovereignty was identified as one of these focused streams.
- Projects were asked to identify one of the following focus areas: Community Gardens and Food Knowledge Programming, Digital Land Connections, Land-based Camps and Programming, or Sustainable Food Systems
- CRE received 23 proposals from 7 Provinces and Territories, representing a need of over \$579,350 in funding

The Land and Food Sovereignty Stream provided \$275,000 in funding to 11 groups in 5 Provinces and Territories

- Projects were funded in Alberta (2), British Columbia (2), New Brunswick (1), Ontario (4) and Saskatchewan (2)
- 55% of grantees are running programs on reserve, 9% are supporting youth in rural locations, 27% are working in urban centers, and 9% are serving remote communities.
- Funded groups will collectively reach 700 youth and 1,100 community members.

**Impact Overview** 

The Digital Sharing and Storytelling Stream provided funding of up to \$20,000 to Indigenous youth-led projects and groups non-profits that are using technology to digitally share stories, knowledge and experiences.


- Each year, the CREation Advisory Circle determines 3-4 Emerging Needs Streams. These streams are different than other streams in that they have a targeted focus and funding goal that is based on community needs. Digital Sharing and Storytelling Stream was identified as one of these focused streams.
- Projects fell under one of the following focus areas: Building Our Capacity, Creating New Platforms, Sharing Our Knowledge and Perspectives or Telling Our Stories.
- CRE received 19 applications for funding, representing a request for \$379,000 in funding

The Digital Sharing and Storytelling Stream provided \$220,000 in funding to 11 groups in 7 Provinces and Territories

#### 36% of grantees were in urban areas, 36% on reserve, 18% in rural communities and 9% in remote communities.

- 73% of grantees focused on *Telling Our Stories*
- Funded groups will collectively reach 15,000 youth directly and an additional 12,000 through digital engagement.

# EDUCATION AND TRAINING

**Impact Overview** 


The Education and Training stream will provide funding of up to \$20,000 to Indigenous youth-led groups, non-profits and school groups running programs and initiatives that focus on supporting Indigenous youth to enhance their skill-building and stay engaged in educational spaces.

- Each year, the CREation Advisory Circle determines 3-4 Emerging Needs Streams. These streams are different than other streams in that they have a targeted focus and funding goal that is based on community needs. The Education and Training Stream was identified as one of these focused streams.
- Projects fell under one of the following focus areas: Building a Student Community (Post-Secondary), Building a Student Community (Elementary and Highschool), Creating Mentorship Opportunities, Education Resources and Supports or Strengthening Our Skills
- CRE received 6 applications for funding, representing a request for \$119,000 in funding

# The Education and Training Stream provided \$99,500 in funding to 5 groups in 3 Provinces and Territories

- 60% of grantees were running projects in urban areas.
- Projects were funded in Alberta, British Columbia and Saskatchewan.
- Funded groups will collectively reach 200 youth directly, and an additional 100,000 through digital engagement.

# SHARED STRUGGLE AND SOLIDARITY


The Shared Struggle and Solidarity Stream provided funding of up to \$25,000 to projects that aimed to strengthen solidarity between BIPOC youth and provide relationship-building opportunities to strengthen community connections.


- Each year, the CREation Advisory Circle determines 2-4 Emerging Needs Streams. These streams are different than other streams in that they have a targeted focus and funding goal that is based on community needs. Shared Struggle and Solidarity was identified as one of these focused streams.
- Projects were asked to select a focus area from the following list: Sharing Knowledge and Culture, Learning History and Lived Realities, Reclaiming and Rebuilding, or Changing Systems
- CRE received 11 proposals from 6 Provinces and Territories, representing a need of over \$290,000 in funding

The Shared Struggle and Solidarity Stream provided \$150,000 in funding to 6 groups in 3 Provinces.

- Projects focused on Sharing Knowledge and Culture (4 projects), Reclaiming and Rebuilding (1) and Learning History and Lived Realities (1)
- Funded groups were in Ontario, Quebec and Saskatchewan.
- Funded groups will engage over 460 youth and 325 community members.

#### ALBERTA COMMUNITY TOGETHERNESS SOCIETY

FORT MCMURRAY, GRAND PRAIRIE -YOUTH EMPOWEREMENT STREAM-

Alberta Community Togetherness Society will provide ongoing, accessible and responsive support services for youth struggling with addiction and mental health challenges. Activities include mental health coaching, narrative counselling approach and workshops on assertiveness and goal setting.

# INSPIRING INDIGENOUS YOUTH SUCCESS CONFERENCE

RED DEER
-YOUTH EMPOWEREMENT STREAM-

Inspiring Indigenous Youth Success Conference is an urban-Indigenous-youth-focused conference meant to bring Indigenous youth together and engage them with local Indigenous leaders. It will help youth visualize potential futures. Workshops and speaker sessions, youth will also build their capacities and skills.

#### MIYOPIMATISOWIN

KEHEWIN CREE NATION
-MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

miyopimatisowin will run a 5-day-long day camp to focused on land-based programming. This will connect knowledge keepers, elders, and youth. Youth will learn to live off the land, and how to respectfully plant and harvest. They will also learn about traditional medicine prepartions.

#### EMPOWERING CREE-METIS YOUTH ATHLETES IN TREATY 8

PEAVINE METIS SETTLEMENT
-MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

Empowering Cree-Metis Youth Athletes in Treaty 8 Through Culture Based Sports Programming will host 12 workshops focused on cultural teachings, mental health, and wellness. They will also be teaching youth how to play hockey to promote physical wellbeing.

#### MIYO-PIMÂTISIWIN

SADDLE LAKE CREE NATION -MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

miyopimatisowin will offer a culture camp to allow local youth to reconnect with their culture. Youth will have the oppurtunity to learn about hunting( safe practices, understanding the land, hunting protocols, how to clean and tan hide). They will also learn about ribbon skirts, and the traditional knowledge around them. Every day, there will also be having pipe ceremonies to start and end activities.

# FORWARD YOUTH INITIATIVE

FROG LAKE FIRST NATION
-YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STREAM-

Forward Youth Initiative will organize and host a Round Dance. Youth will work with community members, and receive informal mentoring from leaders at the Frog Lake Fisrt Nation's school to build capacity and organize key parts of a Round Dance. This will engage youth in physical activity, spiritual wellness, cultural connections, intergenerational learning, and leadership development.

#### MIYO-PIMÂTISIWIN CULTURAL CAMP

SADDLE LAKE CREE NATION, SMOKEY
LAKE
-LAND AND FOOD SOVEREIGNTY-

miyo-pimâtisiwin Cultural Camp is a 4day camp that will provide traditional ways and teachings to 15 Indigenous youth from Saddle Lake and Smokey Lake.

# MORNING SKY HEALTH & WELLNESS SOCIETY

FROG LAKE FIRST NATION
-LAND AND FOOD SOVEREIGNTY-

Morning Sky Health and Wellness Society will teach the youth of Frog Lake First Nation the benefits of living off the land, and how the land has been providing for their community since time immemorial.


## OPERATION RECLAMATION

Operation Reclamation is a project designed to help reclaim northern Indigenous art, renew the pieces, and redistribute them within northern communities. This project is needed because art preservation is an integral part of Indigenous culture, history, and revitalization.

#### **NAKODA AV CLUB**

MÎNÎTHNÎ -SMALL PROJECT FUNDING-

Nakoda AV Club will work with Elders to reconnect and reclaim the ways their community used to harvest and use Ochre. Consulting with Elders and Knowledge Keepers is an essential part of their project as it will help ensure they harvest Ochre according to proper protocols, and with ceremony and sustainability in mind.

#### NAPI FRIENDSHIP ASSOCIATION

PINCHER CREEK
-EDUCATION AND TRAINING-

Napi Friendship Association will host a monthly gatherings where mentors with diverse skillsets and youth are brought together to share their experiences and skills. They will host 10 sessions, and sessions will include: visiting a sacred site, careers in trades, a post-secondary job and education fair, and 5 cultural sessions with elders and local knowledge keepers.

## STONEY HEALTH SERVICES

MORLEY
-MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

Stoney Health Services would like to do 10 workshops on drug/alcohol awareness, and 10 land-based traditional practices working with a knowledge keeper to strengthen youth's skills with regards to hunting and gathering.

# URBAN SOCIETY FOR ABORIGINAL YOUTH

-DIGITAL SHARING AND STORYTELLING-

Urban Society for Aboriginal Youth's IndigiTRAILS app is an augmented reality app that utilizes GPS location services to allow community members to access art and experiences in real-life locations. The IndigiTRAILS: Trivia youth leaders will work together to develop 10 trivia questions to integrate into the app. As part of this, they will also launch a new trail on the IndigiTRAILS app.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA



#### DZE L K'ANT FRIENDSHIP CENTRE SOCIETY

HOUSTON, SMITHERS
-LARGE PROJECT FUNDING-

Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre Society has two project sites. In Houston, they will give youth the chance to focus on their mental wellness, while learning about their culture through workshops. In Smithers, they will expand their programming to continue engaging Indigenous youth physically, culturally, emotionally and socially into Winter 2023.

#### GREASY BANNOCK THEATRE

VANCOUVER -SMALL PROJECT FUNDING-

Greasy Bannock Theatre will run weekly improv classes for youth and Elders in their community. Over the course of seven months, Participants will learn about acting and script-writing, and will create a skit together to perform at a public show for their community. Both youth and Elders will hold space for each other, eat together and play improv games together.

#### SAULTEAU FIRST NATION

BRITISH COLOMBIA
-YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STREAM-

Saulteau First Nations will host teaching Circles with youth and elders. They will also organize harm reduction workshops and workshops to assist their community in transitioning out of covid. They will provide a safe space for youth to overcome challenges they face. They also hope to host a weekend full of presenters to empower their nation's youth.

#### DZE L K'ANT FRIENDSHIP CENTRE SOCIETY

SMITHERS, SKEENA-BULKLEY REGION -EDUCATION AND TRAINING-

Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre Society, through their Mentorship Action Plan, will introduce potential career opporunities to Indigenous youth through exploratory workshops. These sessions include practical examples of tasks, skills and knowledge, as well as building partnerships between youth and industry professionals as mentors.

#### **JEHJEH MEDIA**

TLA'AMIN, HOMALCO, KLAHOOSE, KOMOX -DIGITAL SHARING AND STORYTELLING-

jehjeh Media will teach youth how to create their own podcasts. Activities include 4 preliminary training sessions, 10 months of continued mentoring sessions, bi-weekly production meetings and both pre- and post-show meetings. The goal is to help youth produce 10 podcast segments that will aired over the course of 10 months.

#### SPILLING LABRADOR TEA UNDER CEDAR TREES

VICTORIA
-DIGITAL SHARING AND STORYTELLING-

Spilling Labrador Tea Under Cedar Trees will hold in-person & virtual interviews with Indigenous youth in so-called Canada and around the world. They will give youth opportunities to talk about colonialism from their perspectives and cultural contexts. They hope to interview Indigenous youth from countries in both the global north and global south.

#### DZE L K'ANT FRIENDSHIP CENTRE SOCIETY

WET'SUWET'EN AND GITXSAN
TERRITORIES, SMITHERS, TELKWA,
HAZELTON
-LAND AND FOOD SOVEREIGNTY-

Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre Society will give youth the opportunity to connect with nature by bringing Elders and youth together on the land. Youth will have the opportunity to attend 3 Medicine and traditional food walks, 2 day-long rafting trips, and 1 overnight raft excursion.

#### **JEHJEH MEDIA**

TLA'AMIN, HOMALCO, KLAHOOSE, KOMOX -YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STREAM-

jehjeh Media is actively revitalizing and normalizing their ?ay?ajuθəm language in their 4 sister Nations! This grant will allow them to further expand their language-learning resources and create illustrated language flashcards. To develop the cards, they will host workshops to design the images, research sessions for language consultations, and sharing sessions to receive feedback from their livestream audience.

# TAKLA NATION CHIL'KEH YOUTH GROUP

TAKLA LANDING
-YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STREAM-

The Chil'keh youth group will lead equine therapy workshops, to teach youth about horsemanship. The project aims to be a mode of land-based healing, as youth will self-reflect through the land and horses. Elders and Knowledge Keepers will also be invited to host workshops to share cultural knowledge.

#### TAKLA NATION **CHIL'KEH YOUTH** GROUP

TAKLA LAKE -SMALL PROJECT FUNDING-

Takla Nation Chil'keh Youth Group will connect Takla youth with other First Nations' youth by inviting them to join a kayak journey over the summer, so they have the opportunity to travel and camp on Takla Lake. They would like to invite students and their chaperones from Gitanmaax, Nadleh, Fort St James, and the island.

#### THE MCCREARY **CENTRE SOCIETY**

BRITISH COLUMBIA -EDUCATION AND TRAINING-

The McCreary Centre Society's Young Indigenous Research Team aims to support Indigenous youth in acquiring the research and leadership skills they need to take on more leadership roles in the field of health research and policy. A team of Indigenous youth will meet each month to work on Indigenous-led and Indigenous centered community research projects while developing their research skills.

#### TRAPLINE

KAMLOOPS -MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

TRAPLINE will run 6 workshops on films and filmaking in 6 schools in and around Kamloops. They will share films created in past workshops to inspire and encourage youth. Afterwards, youth will encouraged to use their video, animation and audio workstations to get a hands-on introduction to filmmaking gear and philosophies for each media format.

#### TAKLA NATION CHIL'KEH YOUTH GROUP

TAKLA LANDING -LARGE PROJECT FUNDING-

Takla Nation Chil'keh Youth Group will bring their summer students on a fourday guided kayak trip travelling around the perimeter of Takla Lake to connect with Elders and Knowledge Keepers from around the lake. At each location, they will film their activities for other youth who can't attend the kayak trip. They would also like to host a "Coming Home" ceremony for residential school survivors.

#### THE MOOSE HIDE CAMPAIGN

BRITISH COLUMBIA -EDUCATION AND TRAINING-

The Moose Hide Campaign creates educational resources in the form of videos and lesson plans. They aim to use this grant to create 5-6 lesson plan-style resources, create a Moose Hide Campaign picture book for children, and run a landbased healing camp where students will learn about healthy masculinity, mental health, healing paths and the MMIWG2+ epidemic.

#### CHIL'KEH YOUTH GROUP TAKLA LAKE

TAKLA NATION

-MEDIUM PROJECT FUNDING-

Takla Nation Chil'keh Youth Group will continue to run their Meals on Wheels program. Youth will gather twice a week to deliver hot meals to Elders in the community. Once a week, the youth will also gather to share a meal together. This provides a safe space for youth and Elders to share cultural knowledge as well as sharing food.

Youth Warrior Nation will run a landbased cultural exchange between nuučaańuł youth and youth from the St'at'imc Nation. It aims to address food security by providing critical training in safe and responsible hunting and harvesting methods, traditional fishing practices, and inter-community knowledge-sharing.

Inspire Our Nation will plan launch parties for 6 8-week-long programs run by local community leaders. The girls who attend will take on leadership roles and help design the August 2023 Inspire Girl Camp. This project aims to empower young girls to create lasting friendships, develop their gifts and talents, improve self-confidence, and promote mental health strategies.

# PRAIRIES

SASKATCHEWAN, MANITOBA
-DIGITAL SHARING AND STORYTELLING-

Red Tent of the Prairies's Indigenous Birth Project's purpose is to give indigenous women access to traditional cultural knowledge and protocols related to child-birth. They will host recorded online cultural exchanges, and conduct a research project. They will also document and transcribe traditional knowledge to create an online knowledge-exchange community.

#### ST. FRANCES LAND BASED CLUB

SASKATOON, OKEMASIS CREE NATION, OPASKWAYAK CREE NATION -SHARED STRUGGLE AND SOLIDARITY-

St. Frances Land Based Club is a school club created to connect nehiyawak youth to the land. They will partner with three schools to expand the knowledge and experience base of all students from those Cree elementary schools.

This program will offer a space to revitalize women's teachings that have been lost.
